






Double-headed Serpent Artifact. Mosaic; Mexico



Original Concept Art for Tezcatlipoca, God of the Night Sky










## Background Test

I believe that this film differs from what we usually see in mainstream films in two ways, Setting and Artistic style. What struck me the most as a child listening to these legends was trying to put together a mental picture to match the descriptions that were given to me. The story and setting have not been illustrated in a film adaption and challenging this would be interesting. Artistically, the style looks simple and stylized, but with a complex composition merging colors and shapes, we can illustrate a richer story through character interactions.
